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Headmistress Emma Pattison writes...



Jeremy Kyle has had a lot to answer for in the past weeks and I am sure I am not alone in believing that his show, recently described as 'bear baiting' by The Telegraph, has met its deserved end. Kyle sought to reveal the very worst aspects of his guests' characters by exposing them to unkindness and humiliation, often from those they were closest to, making the pain inflicted even more acute. Reading about the lamentable record the show has of exploiting and then abandoning its guests and the subsequent whiplash of commentary on Twitter has saddened me.

Last week was Mental Health week in The UK and I was fortunate enough to have been invited to contribute to a panel discussion at the Royal Society of Medicine. One theme which we explored was the absolute importance of encouraging each student to recognise what is good about him/herself and the ways in which he/she is distinct from peers. Encouraging discussion with and reflection from students in this respect and teaching them to 'wear' these differences and preferences with great pride are, it was argued, the keys to developing stronger mental resilience and improved mental health.



At Croydon High School, we are, of course, so fortunate in so many ways. We already know that every student has a great deal to be proud of and we try, with this very newsletter for example, to ensure she receives the acclaim she deserves. We also recognise that we are a diverse community and we teach each student to celebrate her own individual place within it. I am inspired by every girl who proudly tells me about her culture, the idiosyncrasies in her family and the things which "make me, me". I delight in

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seeing students who demonstrate a robust and deliberate sense of self while showing their joy in belonging to a strong community.

It has been examination week in Senior School and my thoughts have been with all of our students sitting their end of year examinations along with those in Year 11 and Upper Sixth taking their external examinations, hopefully performing at their very best to secure the best outcome they can. In particular, my thoughts have been with those students, staff and parents who have been fasting this week (or perhaps for the students it has been a version of fasting, given it is exam week).

Ramadan is a period of sombre spiritual reflection and increased charitable behaviour for Muslims and I have always had great respect for those who fast in daylight hours for this month each year. One member of staff explained to me that fasting allows him to become closer to God and that all Muslims try to be the very best version of themselves in this month. It is a commendable purpose and one which should inspire us all, whether or not we are fasting.

Our community is one in which endeavour, support and achievement are celebrated and one where the humility and kindness of Croydon High girls is a great source of pride for me. So, best wishes to those who having been sitting exams and everyone in our community observing Ramadan. For those of us who are not, perhaps we could be inspired by our Muslim peers to be the best version of ourselves and celebrate that in others.

The annual Croydon High Spring Concert concert featured a varied and ambitious programme and was a big success, showcasing the numerous musical talents of Croydon High girls.



The Second Orchestra, led by Senaya, started the evening with two British folk songs. The first was the Scottish Ye Banks and Braes (featuring the lower strings imitating bagpipes) and the second was the traditional English Country Garden played with a light-hearted swagger. It was hard to believe that the magnificent sound was being produced by some of the youngest students in the senior school. Next, the Chamber Choir performed a complicated arrangement of Singin' in the Rain and a rousing rendition of The Rhythm of Life from the musical 'Sweet Charity'. The TeenTech Festival is a national STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) event which provides pupils with the opportunity to participate in a range of workshops, to handle leading edge technology and most importantly to spend time with technologists and scientists. With over twenty five schools and forty exhibitors in attendance there was a sense of real excitement throughout the day.

In the Innovation Zone the girls worked in teams to invent a product that would make life better, simpler and safer. The teams identified a real world problem, designed a solution and considered how they would take their product to market. The girls then pitched their ideas to an audience of industry experts and teams from other schools. I am delighted to report that Croydon High won two of the main awards.

Congratulations to Titilayo, Inaya, Holly, Eloise, Krisha, Suvini, Abigail, Aaravi and Jessica for winning the TeenTech Tinkerer Award for Best Invention. The team's "Emergency Stab Pack" invention would provide medical assistance including automated emergency calls with GPS location information in the event of a knife crime.

The TeenTech Award for Best Presentation went to Erna, Amy, Eleanor, Maddy, Rianna, Nyla, Darshali, Shriya, Delicia and Ashwini for their confident and well considered marketing pitch for their "Watch Out" product, a personal security watch with a discreet messaging service.

The Insight and Challenge Zones enabled the girls to experience technology, science and engineering in action and to participate in a range of activities.



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Environmental Report

Specific Cause of Plastic Pollution: Lack of Plastic Recycling

There has been an enormous increase in plastic production since 1950, and most of this is because we are using far more plastic packaging every year and this needs to come to an end now. Plastic takes more than 400 years to break

down and when we don't recycle or repurpose plastic objects (and just put them in the normal bin), this ends up in landfill, and the sites are already overflowing with the amount of rubbish we throw away. This is dangerous and harmful for our planet, sea life and other animals.

Scientists predict that by 2050 the oceans will contain more plastic waste than fish which is shocking, scary and no one would want this to happen. Also 91% of plastic can't be recycled at all and half of all plastic produced becomes waste in less than a year. This is why our landfills are overflowing and our oceans are becoming poisoned with plastic.

We all have to take charge and rise up to the responsibility of looking after our planet and stopping plastic from destroying our oceans. We can all make a change by ensuring we are taking the following steps:

- 1) Make sure we are recycling or reusing as many plastic products as possible
- 2) **At Home -** Stop using unnecessary packaging, e.g. to use lunch boxes instead of cling film for packed lunches and left-over food
- 3) At School Always take our reusable water bottles to school and ask school to provide reusable cups for each classroom in case someone forgets their water bottle. We will ask our caterer to stop using plastic bottles for school trips and let girls take their own water bottles.
- 4) In the shops Not buy items or products which use non-recyclable plastic or too much packaging. Ask shopkeepers to reduce the amount of unnecessary packaging. Always take our reusable bags, coffee mugs and water bottles when we are out because not only will we be saving the planet but

also our money because shops charge for plastic bags, and

hot drinks are usually cheaper if you bring your own mug.

We can also write to the government asking them to ban non-recyclable plastic by making it illegal, so shops won't be able to use it and it will stop harming our oceans and overflowing landfill sites.

Finally, we can write to famous and influential people for support to help us put pressure on the government e.g. when I wrote to Prince Charles (who is interested in plastic pollution and warned the public about it 40 years ago), he said he is "most interested to read about what Croydon High School is doing to help look after the environment."

Careers in the Classroom

We have had a fantastic Careers in the Classroom Week. The week began with an assembly from Mr Pickering who brought in one of his model steam trains, Betsy (yes she has a name). Lower Sixth visits the Supreme Court of the United Kingdom

Our Pathways mentoring programme provides Lower Sixth with an unparalleled practical opportunity to explore particular job sectors and find work experience whilst making sure that relevant university courses are carefully considered. As such, the Pathways mentoring programme provides a cornerstone of our plan to make sure that Sixth Form students are 'real-world ready.' To this end, students have the option of choosing one of the following pathways: law, civil service, medicine, veterinary and dentistry, business, creative industries, media and an open pathway (for those who have yet to find a specific career of interest). Students are free to transfer between different pathways as their career plans inevitably evolve over the Lower Sixth year. Amongst many other things, each 'pathway' undertakes a visit to see the particular career sector 'in action'. This week it was the turn of the Law and Civil Service pathways to explore the Supreme Court of the United Kingdom, the highest court in the UK judicial system and the ultimate arbitrator of civil (and, in some cases, criminal) legal disputes.

Our students were treated to a tour of the main courtrooms by a guide who explained the inner-workings of the court right down to its crest which comprises symbols from the four parts of the United Kingdom (can you spot them?) surrounded by an omega sign (whose finality—as the last letter of the Greek alphabet—symbolises the finality of the court in the legal/appeals hierarchy). Indeed, we learnt that this crest not only colours the judicial makeup of the court—with Justices from Northern Ireland, Scotland, Wales and England sitting alongside each other—but also makes multiple appearances on the carpet throughout the building! The students were given an overview of the court's relatively short history; in fact, this year marks the tenth anniversary of the symbolic move of the court from the House of Lords to the former Middlesex Guildhall on the opposite side of Parliament Square. We learnt that the Justices always sit in odd numbers so that a majority can be reached; we were treated to the background of Baroness Hale of Richmond, the first female President of the Court as well as details of some of the more famous appellant cases it has heard such as *R* (*Miller*) v Secretary of State for Exiting the European Union (the 'Brexit case' led by Gina Miller) and Lee v Asher's Baking Company (the so-called 'gay cake row').

After the tour, we went to a question and answer session with two Judicial Assistants (whose research supports the Justices): an opportunity not ordinarily available to school groups. Our students asked a rich set of questions which ranged from the specifics of studying law at university and the ethnicity of certain legal issues to the practicalities of the separation of the legal and government systems. Our students (and accompanying staff) came away inspired by what they saw and heard. Perhaps, just perhaps, one or more of our number will be appearing as barristers, solicitors or even Justices of the Supreme Court in the not-so-distant future!

Race for The Line Competition—Regional Finals

Our Race For The Line school champions Milly, Leona, Rebecca and Aiyana successfully represented the school at the regional finals of this year's Race For The Line competition.

With a place at the national finals at stake, the girls had to design and build a rocket-powered car and race this against teams from twelve other schools. The girls applied their 3D design skills and knowledge of aerodynamics and forces to create a high performance car, narrowly missing the nationals by just one tenth of a second. The human eye blinks slower at three tenths of a second! This was an incredible engineering feat and an outstanding team performance of which we are very proud.

After the race, a loose wheel was identified as the potential problem, which if tightened might have made all the difference! The girls were so keen that they wanted to fix the wheel and race again. The girls have offered to mentor the school teams competing in next year's competition, so will be invited to Enterprise Technology lessons to act as design consultants.


